General Questions About Jordan

Is Jordan safe for tourists?

Jordan is recognized as one of the safest countries in the Middle East for travelers. The local communities and government are very welcoming towards tourists.

What is the best time to visit Jordan?

The ideal times to visit are during spring (March to May) and autumn (September to November), when the weather is mild and perfect for sightseeing.

What currency is used in Jordan?

The currency in Jordan is the Jordanian Dinar (JOD), commonly abbreviated as JD.

What languages are spoken in Jordan?

Arabic is the official language; however, English is widely spoken in tourist areas, hotels, and restaurants.

Do I need a visa to enter Jordan?

Most travelers require a visa to enter Jordan. Many nationalities can obtain a visa on arrival, but it's advisable to check the latest requirements with your travel agent or the Jordanian embassy.

What are the must-visit attractions in Jordan?

- Petra (a UNESCO World Heritage site)
- Wadi Rum desert
- The Dead Sea

- Jerash (ancient Roman ruins)
- Amman (the capital city)
- Aqaba (Red Sea snorkeling and diving)
- Mount Nebo and Madaba (historical and religious sites)

How many days do I need to explore Jordan?

A typical tour generally spans 7 to 10 days for a relaxed exploration. Shorter itineraries (3 to 5 days) cover Petra, Wadi Rum, and the Dead Sea.

Can you customize my tour?

Yes, tours can be personalized based on your interests, group size, and budget.

Are group or private tours available?

Both group and private tours are offered. Group tours are more economical, while private tours offer greater flexibility.

What type of transportation is used?

Modern air-conditioned vehicles are standard, including cars, minibuses, and buses depending on group size.

Stick to bottled or filtered water, which is readily available.

Cultural Considerations

What are the cultural norms and etiquette?

- Dress modestly in rural/religious areas
- Greet with a handshake or nod
- Ask before photographing locals
- Avoid showing the soles of your feet

Are there rules for visiting religious sites?

Yes. Cover shoulders and knees. Remove shoes when entering mosques.

Is alcohol available?

Yes, in hotels and licensed restaurants, though less common in rural areas.

Special Experiences

Can I stay overnight in the desert?

Yes. Overnight stays in Wadi Rum range from simple camps to luxury accommodations.

What can I do at the Dead Sea?

Float in the saltwater, enjoy a mud bath, or relax at a spa.

Are adventure activities available?

Yes. Hiking in Dana Reserve, canyoning in Wadi Mujib, rock climbing in Wadi Rum, and diving in Aqaba.

Health And Safety

Do I need vaccinations?

Routine vaccinations (measles, polio, tetanus) are recommended. Consult your doctor before traveling.

What about medical emergencies?

Jordan has good medical facilities in major cities.
